

Modules in English for Inbound Exchange Students in the Autumn Semester 2024

- Should students need more ECTS Credits in general or are interested in booking a module from another study subject, they can add a few modules from this list.
- Please only book modules that correspond with your study level (i.e. BA-level students only book BA-level modules and MA-level students only book MA-level modules).
- **Please note that pass/fail modules are never graded, which means that you will not receive a grade on the UZH transcript of records.**

This list contains two types of modules (indicated in table below):

Type A: Modules that were created especially for inbound exchange students (open to BA and/or MA level students)
 These modules are open to any students from the respective study level (BA and/or MA) and no previous knowledge is needed at all. Please scroll down for the flyers with more information on these special modules and on how to book them.

Type B: Modules from the regular study program of UZH departments that are also open to inbound students from other subjects
 Some departments at the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences have agreed to open some regular modules to inbound exchange students from other subjects. Since these modules are part of the regular study program of a department, for some of them, previous knowledge might be beneficial. Zurich's Global Revolutionaries, 1890-1960 (Colloquium)

Course description:

“In Zurich, everything seemed in order, whereas the rest of the world seemed to be spinning out of control.” (Charles Epping. *Trust*. Greenleaf Press, 2006, p. 7)

Zurich, like Switzerland in general, is often portrayed in terms that evoke a sense not only of safety, but also of boredom: clean, prosperous, neutral, and so on. And yet, several revolutionary developments of the first half of the twentieth century were in fact linked to this supposedly tranquil city on the banks of the river Limmat – developments ranging across fields as varied as literature, politics, psychology, art, and physics.

After briefly considering two earlier periods of radical change (specifically, the Zwinglian Reformation and the decades following the French Revolution), we will devote our attention to figures associated with major twentieth-century upheavals: Rosa Luxemburg and Vladimir Ilyich Lenin; C. G. Jung, Sigmund Freud, and Sabina Spielrein; Albert Einstein, Erwin Schrödinger and Wolfgang Pauli; the Dadaists, James Joyce, and Bertolt Brecht; and the anonymous gay activists of *Der Kreis*. We will study excerpts from literary texts by and about these figures, in combination with historical materials, to address questions such as: Why did these revolutionaries come to Zurich? What made their contributions so revolutionary? And what, more generally, can their work teach us about the concept of revolution and its relevance today?

Note: The course will include two site visits in Zurich (to the Cabaret Voltaire and to the James Joyce Foundation). In addition, third-party funding will be sought for two excursions: (a) to the Einsteinhaus and the Einstein Museum in Bern, and (b) to the Haus C. G. Jung in Küsnacht.

Assessment:

- **oral presentation (1/3):**
 - presentation (5–10 min, with handout) on a Zurich poem, incl. background information on the persons and/or places mentioned in the poem (max. 20 points)
- **learning portfolio (2/3):**
 - ten homework tasks (max. 2 points per task; 20 points overall)
 - two-page handout on a historical figure who appears on a commemorative plaque in Zurich (incl. photos of the plaque and surroundings; max. 20 points)



Learning Objectives:

By the end of the course, participants will not only have gained a better sense of Zurich's significance as a node within diverse networks of transnational revolution but will also be able to reflect more broadly on the historical and philosophical relationships between different types of revolutionary transformation.

Module enrolment:

This module awards 3 ECTS. Spaces are limited to 25 students.

Science, Technology, and Society (Seminar)

Course description:

Science and technology play increasingly large roles in our lives. Many of our major societal problems today—climate change, pandemics, world hunger, mental health, artificial intelligence—are presented as problems that only science and technology can solve. And yet at the core of these problems we find basic philosophical questions. This course is a philosophical investigation into the relationships between science, technology, and society. We are going to weave together three threads:

1. *Epistemology of Science.* We will ask, what is science? How does science produce knowledge? Why should we trust it? We will examine the works of the Logical Empiricists, Karl Popper, Thomas Kuhn, and Helen Longino.
2. *Scientific Controversy.* How can we criticize science without being either scientific or anti-science? We will examine the controversial cases of Eugenics (when society trusted science too much), Climate Change Denial (when society did not trust science enough), and Adaptationism (a longstanding controversy within biology).
3. *Technology and Society.* How should we as a society use technology? We will look at the roles of social media and Artificial Intelligence in our lives. We will examine the benefits and harms of these technologies and how we can better regulate them personally and socially.

Learning Objectives: The main goal of this course is to learn how to better criticize science and technology without trusting either too little or too much. Along the way, we will learn how to think and speak better about science, scientific controversies, and the roles of technology in society.

Module enrolment:

This module awards 6 ECTS. Spaces are limited to 40 students.

Enemies of Thought: Stupidity, Nonsense, and Bullshitting (Seminar)

Course description:

This course is a general introduction to intellectual ethics, focusing on what might be called the enemies of thought: stupidity, nonsense, and bullshitting. Through philosophical analysis, we will examine these interconnected concepts to gain a deeper understanding of their treatment in contemporary philosophy. What is the nature of stupidity? How does it differ from error or irrationality? Is stupidity an intellectual vice? What attitudes correspond to foolishness and stupidity? Is stupidity a form of insensitivity or indifference to intellectual values? The concept of nonsense, which was central to philosophical debates in the early twentieth century, will also be scrutinized. We will explore why nonsense is so prevalent and discuss how to avoid it. Additionally, the course will delve into the nature of bullshit and bullshitting, exploring its real-world manifestations and discussing how to articulate its specific wrongness. This module introduces students to contemporary research in epistemology and the philosophy of language, and serves as a tool for training in critical thinking.

Learning Objectives:

- Gaining understanding of some key philosophical concepts, theories, and arguments.
- Acquiring the ability to analyze, evaluate, and clearly explain the theses, issues, and arguments present in a philosophical paper.
- Encouraging students to reflect on their own beliefs, values, and intellectual perspectives.
- Motivating students to be open-minded and intellectually curious about philosophy.

Module enrolment:

This module awards 6 ECTS. Spaces are limited to 40 students.
